Subject:	Dental Screening for Kindergarten Entrants

Section 333.9316 of the Public Health Code requires that all children in Michigan enrolled in their first year of school, either kindergarten or 1<sup>st</sup> grade, receive an oral health assessment ("dental screening"). This requirement began in the 2024-25 school year. MDHHS is required by law to establish and maintain a statewide Kindergarten Oral Health Assessment Program (KOHA) to provide the dental screenings at no cost to families. Similar to Michigan's school-based hearing and vision screening programs, the dental screening program is carried out at the local level through local health departments or their designee. The program is in Phase 3 of a three-year phased implementation plan with the goal for full statewide implementation by the end of 2025.

Please note the following points regarding the kindergarten dental screenings:

- **<u>Parents/guardians</u>** are responsible for getting their child's dental screening completed.
- <u>Schools</u> facilitate the screenings by communicating the requirement to parents along with the options for screening. Schools can also coordinate with their local health department to provide the screenings on-site during registration events and during the kindergarten school year.
- Local health departments (or their designees) offer no-cost dental screenings to all eligible children within their service area and coordinate events with local schools and pre-K settings.
- Dental screenings can take place prior to entry into kindergarten but no earlier than 6 months prior to the start of school. They can also take place during the kindergarten school year through May 31<sup>st</sup>.
- Children <u>cannot</u> be barred from enrolling in or attending school if the dental screening is not completed prior to the start of the school year. Schools *in counties that have implemented the KOHA program* are encouraged to arrange for <u>local health departments</u> to provide in-school dental screenings during the kindergarten school year in an effort to reach children who did not have it done prior to the start of school.
- The MDHHS Dental Assessment Form (MDHHS-6067) or a letter from a private dental office are acceptable forms of documentation.

• All Michigan schools are required to report their dental screening data to the State. Schools that receive proof of screening from a parent/guardian or local health department should select the "Dental Screened" checkbox in MCIR. Selecting this box in MCIR indicates a student was screened and fulfills the school's reporting requirement to the State.

Schools located within a 2025-26 school year implementation area should do the following:

- Communicate information about the dental screening requirement to parents. The Dental Assessment Form (MDHHS-6067) and other resources can be found on the <u>MDHHS KOHA</u> website.
- Work with local health department staff to coordinate dental screenings at pre-enrollment events and on-site during the kindergarten school year.

Schools NOT located within a 2025-26 school year implementation area:

• Dental screenings are not yet available through the local health department in your area. Encourage parents/guardians to have the dental screening done at a private dental office for the 2025-26 school year.
